GENERAL INFORMATION FOR CS 217

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION:</u> Design, implementation and deployment of applications, Web services, and components in an enterprise environment. Uses the latest tools and languages supported by the .NET framework.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Convert an existing VB or C++ program to a web service.
- 2. Design and implement an ASP.NET based program utilizing relational databases and SQL.
- 3. Use existing web controls and create new Web controls to implement a web based application.
- 4. Integrate a data source with a web control or Web service.
- 5. Work cooperatively in small groups to design, program, and deploy applications, Web services, and components.

PREREQUISITE: CS 115 with a minimum grade of 2.5.

- 6. Memorize important identities, definitions, and results. More importantly, learn ASP.NET by writing, writing, and writing as many programs as you can. You learn programming by doing it!
- 7. Copy the examples from the CD that accompanies the text and create a work folder on your hard drive.

- 8. There is no make up for the in-class final exam.
- 9. Let me repeat myself and be redundant: it is imperative that you participate in the discussion in class and during group or team project presentation.
- 10. Ask questions and seek help when puzzled and offer timely help to others in need. This help should not include sharing of code, however, except in group and team project. You are expected to take the quizzes and final exam on your own without any help.
- 11. Download and install Visual Studio 2013 on your home computer immediately.
