Course Description

Learn the basics of working in a project team. Students create plans that identify project scope, constraints, stakeholders and risks, and then explore customer needs and requirements. The course includes an introduction to scheduling. Team and communication skills are strongly emphasized.

- Describe the role of project management in a variety of contemporary organizational structures.
- Identify skills and attributes required to be a successful project manager.
- Initiate a project and manage it to successful completion, using concepts learned throughout the course.
- Demonstrate ability to lead a project team and be a productive project team member.

- Create planning documents: write a scope statement, identify project constraints, determine customer requirements, evaluate stakeholders and identify risks.
- Use project management tools including Work Breakdown Structures, Project Plans, Statements of Work and basic Network Diagrams.
- Act responsibly, both individually and collaboratively, within changing environments. Demonstrate ability to lead a project team and be a productive project team member.

TEAM EXERCISE INSTRUCTIONS

More information / explanation will be provided in class.

You will be assigned to a specific team to work with throughout the course.

The scenario:

The demand for people trained in the discipline of Project management has been increasing in both the product and service industries. To support this demand, a community college in the Seattle area has decided to offer a certification program in the field of project management. This program would be generic, in that it would not be directed toward any specific industry. The program would focus on knowledge and application of standard tools, techniques, processes and procedures associated with project management.

Your team has been selected to design, develop and initiate this certification program. There is pressure from several sources to get the program in place as soon as possible. Current local and state budget issues are also complicating things.

Your specific assignment:

Your team will generate a formal Project Charter for a project based on this scenario, using the format and content suggestions contained in the text. Your Charter will contain the following elements:

1. Scope Overview
2. Business Case
3. Background
4. Milestone Schedule
5. Success Criteria
6. Risks, Assumptions and Constraints
7. Cost / Budget Estimate
8. Stakeholder List
9. Team Operating Principles
10. Lessons Learned
11. Signatures and Commitment

The Charter is to be professionally produced, bound and formally delivered.

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE INSTRUCTIONS

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE ONE **PM Informational Interview**

Think toward your future and identify an organization in your industry of choice. Identify and contact a project management professional or an employee with project management responsibilities in this organization or agency. Please try to choose someone

you are not related to, and do not know well. The idea is to make a NEW contact in your chosen field.

Conduct an in-person informational interview, using the questions listed below, and adding any of your own. Your interview must focus on project management specifically.

Document the interview and post it on the Discussion Board – an Interview Forum will be provided. Students should review all posted interviews and be prepared to discuss their observations in class.

Please send a thank you note to your interviewee!

Suggested Interview Questions:

- 1) Describe the nature of your organization....product or service.
- 2) What is your role in project management activities in this organization?
- 3) What trends are emerging in project management, or how projects are managed in organizations, that are different from 3-5 years ago?
- 4) What are the three greatest challenges of being a project manager in your industry?
- 5) Specifically what you are doing to meet those challenges?
- 6) What do you see as the fastest growing career opportunities in project management?
- 7) For a career in project management, what are the most essential skills, abilities, education and experiences a person needs to be competitive?

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE TWO

Individual Project Plan – 1st Draft

This exercise, you are to choose your own project to document. It can be a personal or work project – or one you “make-up”.

Complete the steps below:

Project Scope Statement

Describe the scope of your project. Clearly state what is included in the project and what is not.

Project Constraints

State the project constraints under the categories: budget, deadline, and quality specifications. Explain which of these constraints is the **least** flexible, and **why**.

Stakeholders

List at least 5 stakeholders in this project. Identify each person’s role. Explain what motivates each stakeholder in relation to this project. (Remember, the role is *different* than the motivation.)

Risk Forecast

Identify and describe three potential pitfalls, or problems that may come up during this project. The risks must be specific to this project and must be related to the process of completing the project. This section will answer the question “what is likely to go wrong that will keep our team from successfully completing this project?”

INDIVIDUAL EXERCISE THREE

Stakeholder Presentation

Using the individual project that you documented in Individual Exercise Two, pick one stakeholder and prepare a presentation telling them about the project. The goal of the presentation is to explain the basics of the project to this stakeholder group, explain what it will mean for them, and get them excited about it. This presentation has a limit of 2-3 minutes, so it is just a brief summary.

Prepare a set of notes that you would use when giving the presentation. Each student will give their presentation in class. Each student will submit their presentation notes.
